The Story the Candy Cane Tells

- Upside down the letter "J" for Jesus!
 - Matthew 1:25 (called His name Jesus)
 - Luke 1:31 (call His name Jesus)
 - o The Name of Jesus (hymn by W.C. Martin)
 - -first verse

The name of Jesus is so sweet, I love its music to repeat; It makes my joys full and complete, The precious name of Jesus.

- Upside right the shepherd's staff (Jesus is the Good Shepherd)
 - o John 10
 - o Key verses 11 and 14 (does the job of a shepherd)
- Sweet the love of Jesus
 - John 15:12 (love as Jesus loved)

- 1 John 3:16 (God loved the world)
- Ephesians 3:17-19 (love that passes knowledge)
- Stripes the suffering Jesus did for us on the cross
 - Isaiah 53:5 (by His stripes we are healed)
 - 1 Peter 2:24 (by His stripes)
 - John 1:19 (scourged or whipped)
- Red the blood Jesus shed for our sins
 - Ephesians 1:7 (forgiveness through His blood)
 - Revelation 5:9 (redeemed by the blood)
- White Jesus takes away the sins of the world
 - John 3:16 (none should perish)
 - John 1:29 (takes away the sins of the world)
 - 1 John 4:14 (Savior of the world)
